This final evaluation compares the achievements and progress of a student with the achievements and progress of others in the select group of 30 students, admitted to the Center last September, who have now completed our intensive program in advanced Japanese. These comparative evaluations are based upon assessments made by the 12 full-time instructors that have taught all 30 and listened to their 15-minute oral reports, delivered in Japanese a few days ago. The "general evaluation" is written by the Director, after advising students throughout the year and talking with instructors about the special problems and abilities of particular students.

Scoring: 1 places the student in the top third of the group, 2 in the middle third, and 3 in the bottom third.


